



Site Description	This site is recorded in the OS memoirs as "the remains of an old building said to be a castlethe cellar with the steps leading down into it was destroyed c.20 years ago". The tradition of a castle is still known locally & the outbuildings at a farm called "the Castle" are said to have been built with stones from the O'Kane castle.		
	The site has good views. There are no visible remains of a fortification here. An archaeological evaluation was carried out just SE of the castle site, prior to development. A series of 7 test trenches was excavated across the development site. No archaeological features or artefacts were uncovered [CAF, May 06].		
Landscape Context	The Duncrun castle site remains are located a short distance beyond the Magilligan LCA		
(setting)	boundary at the foothills of Binevenagh, overlooking the lowlands below which originally would have been intrinsically linked to the site in terms of territory, farming, and defence during the medieval/late medieval period.		
Site Appraisal	This is an SMR site.		
Sensitivity	The site is destroyed/removed however there are farm buildings that may have been built with the original castle stone.		
Associations	The site is located close to Duncrun Ecclesiastical remains (LDY005:002) and an enclosure site known as 'Dunpatrick' LDY005:006.		
	The site is said to have been associated with the O'Kane clan.		
	The barony of Keenaght <i>is named after the Cianachta Glenn Geimin ("race of Cain of Glengiven") and was</i> associated with the O'Connors, one of this clan, from the 5th century. The area was ceded to the O'Kanes from the 12 th century. Followers of the O'Kanes included <i>Mac Giollagain</i> (MacGilligan) from whom the study area has retained it name.		
Recommendations	This site located within a private farm settlement known as The Castle. Accessibility is restricted as a result.
