



Site Description	On the summit of a hill; the summit probably reflects the limits of the site, but there is no visible evidence of an enclosure & the AP may simply reflect the natural topography. The summit is 53m x 50m across. There are no visible remains of the church recorded by Reeves as 35 x 19ft. The cross slab is set upright in the E edge of the stone boundary which crosses the site. It has a dressed front & sides & is 1.32m high & 0.42m wide at the base, widening to 0.53m at the top. The cross carved on the slab is a double-armed "Cross of Lorraine". The church is said to have been founded by St.Patrick. See SM7 for AP etc.		
Landscape Context	The Duncrun ecclesiastical site remains are located a short distance beyond the Magilligan		
(setting)	LCA boundary at the foothills of Binevenagh, overlooking the lowlands below which		
	originally would have been intrinsically linked to the site in terms of territory, farming, and		
	defence during the medieval/late medieval period.		
Site Appraisal	This is a scheduled site with traces only visible. The cross is still extant. This is a scheduled site, which is an indication of its significance to the archaeological record of Northern Ireland.		
Sensitivity	It is unknown how vulnerable the site is to human interference and whether it is susceptible to regular visits/traffic.		
Associations	The site is located at 'Abbey, Canon Brae, Church Hill' which clearly indicate its importance status during the medieval period. It is marked as 'Abbey in ruins' on the 2 nd ed OS map. It is also said to have been founded by St Patrick, similar to the Tamlaght ecclesiastical remains nearby to the south.
