Description



CITY IMPROVEMENTS.



MESSRS. WILLIAM AUSTIN & CO.'S NEW PREMISES, DIAMOND & FERRYQUAY-STREET.
(DIAMOND FRONTAGE)

The eastern side of the Diamond will be very greatly improved by the handsome building which is being erected at the corner of Ferryquay-street by Mr. Joseph Ballintine for Messrs, William Austin & Co. We give a sketch of the main elevation facing the Diamond. The frontage to Ferryquay street is narrower, but partakes of the same architectural character. The new and imposing structure takes the place of one of the oldest of the houses existing in the locality. It must have been built soon after the Siege, and some of the heavy oak beams found in the walls at the demolition of the house were probably originally used in the construction of the wooden frame houses brought over from Lendon nearly three centuries ago and ercoted in Derry. The timbers are still in a good state of preservation. The upper part of the old corner house, which has now been taken down, was for many years used as Judgea' lodgings. The rooms were occupied by two very respectable ladies named Sheill, who had the honour for a very long period of entertaining under their roof some of the most distinguished judges of the Irish Bench. Baron Pennefather and many of his judicial contemporaries occupied the Miss Sheill's apartments circuit after circuit. It is said that the reason why these lodgings were chosen was on account of the Miss Sheills having the largest and most valuable collection of silver plate in the

city at that time. A gentleman connected with the Sentinel recollects being sent when a young man with a copy of Sounders' News Letter to the judges' lodgings, where he was ushered into the presence of Baron Pennelather. Saunders' was then the leading paper in Ireland for law reports, and the venerable Baron wanted to read the report of a particular case, but his registrar not being at hand ho requested the messenger of the Sentinel to read the case for him, while he reclined in a capacious armchair. This was done to his satisfaction. The judges' rooms were the scene of many a festive and jovial party. When the new race of judges came on the circuit they objected to the lowness of the cailing in the house, and ultimately changed to new lodgings. The house has now disappeared altogether, and its place will be taken by a building more in harmony with the modern aspect of the Maiden City. We have already given some particulars of the plans. The feature of the ground floor will be a spacious shop occupying the corner, and having frontages to the Dismond and Ferryquay street. This shop is intended to be occupied as a druggist's establishment by Mr. Richard Austin, who, we are glad to state, is now happily recovering from a very severe and dangerous illness. Mr. James Croom is the architect of the building.



Rebuilt after a fire, to designs by M A Robinson. The building is an imaginative, flamboyant design, with bold modelling which admirably expresses the function of the place. A great conglomeration of large windows, columns and pedestals, balconies and a conscious attempt to turn the corner with an applied tower terminating in a copper-covered cupola. The building is finished externally in smooth rendering, untreated. Internally the main feature of the plan is the open well going through the three floors of the building, with the sales floors on three sides at each level.

Austin's Department Store, 1906 by M A Robinson, is by far the largest building in the square and memorable for its free-wheeling Edwardian Baroque frontages with more than a hint of 18th century Austria and Art Nouveau.

The Buildings of Ireland, North West Ulster, Alistair Rowan, 1979

Austin's Department Store, established 1830. The first Austin's building was destroyed by fire in 1905, which also set alight the clock tower of the former Corporation Hall in the centre of the Diamond. The building, which has a steel frame, underwent major external refurbishment and repair in 2005, including painting of the previously untreated smooth render. Contemporary plastic panelling and external roller shutters detract from the otherwise intact frontage.

Three-storey corner building with smooth rendered façade and brick piers below overly deep shopfront fascia signage. Six-bay frontage with Diamond, three-bay frontage with Bishop's Street, double height structural opening on curved corner. Powder coated aluminium casement windows with top hung opening lights all with plain window surrounds. Slate roof. Earlier building of 1882 by Croom and Toye, demolished.

History

1882 Architects: Croom and Toye

M.M.Scott. Part of the new front was added to the building by Croom and Toye, architects. The main feature of this building is the rounded corner used frequently in the old part of the town. It is most likely that all the corners in the diamond were handled in this way. It is interesting to note that the designers of Messrs.G.Austin and No.2 Butcher Street paid much attention to this feature, unlike some more recent attempts. This building also features well models corbels forming a sort of cornice and giving support to the gutter. The windows have simple Georgian character, well proportioned.

Three-storey, three-bay, stuccoed building in an Italianate style. Rusticated at ground floor. Decorative moulded band course and pilasters. Segmental aedicule and moulded door surround to eight-panel front door with square glazed light over. One-over-one vertical sliding sash painted timber windows, square heads at ground and first floor, swept heads at second floor. Moulded window heads with keystones at ground and second floor. Console bracketed moulded cornice, decorative ironwork balustrade at eaves between masonry piers, finials removed. Natural slate roof.



A three-storey building rendered externally, with a curious mix of round-headed windows. Remodelled by W A Barker, architect, in 1883, it would be much improved by a more sympathetic colour scheme and the elimination of recent large letters at parapet wall level.







Description

The war memorial is built on the site of the former town halls. The basement, which may have been used as prison cells prior to 1784, has been retained underground. Originally unfenced, the space around the war memorial is a vantage place from which to view the scene. The centre of the design is a winged figure, 20 feet high, emblematic of victory; on either side of it are figures representing a soldier and sailor in action.





History

The Corporation Hall stands in the centre of the Diamond, on the site of the original Town-House, or Exchange, which was creeted by the London corporation in 1622, at an expense of £500.



It has been already stated in the General History, that so early as 1616 it was considered that "a market house and a town house should be erected in Derry, by which the city of London would

The Concise View of the Irish Society records that on the 6th of May, 1691, "A warrant was issued to the wood-rangers, to supply sixty tons of timber, towards rebuilding the market-house, repairing the gates, and other public buildings in Derry at the usual rates;" and that on the 4th of December following, it appeared "that one hundred and twenty tons of timber, and forty thousand laths, were allowed for building the town-house of Derry."


The Town-House, or "Their Maiesties Exchange," was accordingly rebuilt by the corporation, in 1692, on the 15th of April in which year the first stone was laid by Bishop King and Alderman Lecky. The plan was designed by Captain Francis Neville.

In 1823 the corporation undertook to give the Town-House such a thorough repair as should be almost tantamount to re-creetion. The expense was £5500 9s. 11d., with £400 for furniture, although an outlay of no more than £2000 had been originally contemplated. The new building is inscribed with the date of its completion:—"1826." It measures 120 feet by 45. The southern part, in which is the principal entrance, is circular. The upper story contains the common council-room; an assembly-room, which measures 75 feet by 36; and an ante-chamber: the assembly-room is occasionally used for balls, concerts, public exhibitions, and corporation dinners. In the lower story, now closed ally used for balls, concerts, public exhibitions, and corporation dinners. In the lower story, now closed in, there is a news-room, established by the corporation in 1835; and a well-appointed kitchen. A dancing academy, also, was for some time held in this building.



The New Market House was built in the Diamond on the site of its predecessor in 1692. It was a rectangular structure with short cross arms at the south end, dignified by an attempted classical order with an open arcade on the ground floor and assembly rooms above. Meal and potatoes from the surrounding area were bought and exchanged within its open arcades, and it continued as the exchange for over 130 years...In 1826 the Exchange shared with most Irish arcaded markets the indignity of having its arches built up to accommodate a Public Reading Room.

IRISH SOCIETY VISITATION IN LONDONDERRY.

THE CLEARING OF THE DIAMOND!

The Mayor and Town Clerk and several members of the Corporation called yesterday at the Irish Society's House, St. Columb's Court, to pay their respects to Alderman Newton, Governor, and the other members of the Visitation of the Irish Society now in the city. The Mayor having welcomed the Visitation on behalf of the cityzens, mentioned that the Corporation had no matters in particular to bring before them on this occasion further than to express appreciation of their action in making grants towards the equipping of Brooke Park and the Brandywell-road municipal grounds. In the course of the conversation which ensued it was understood that the Irish Society took it that the site offered by them for a public library in Foyle-street had been deemed unsuitable for the purpose. The Governor intimated that the Society would be glad to assist the Corporation in ornamenting the Diamond consequent upon the removal of the existing building. The Mayor and deputation remained for lunch.

THE DIAMOND GARDENS

It is frequently our pleasure to congratulate Mr. Lindsay, parks superintendent, on the taste and beauty which characterise the laying out of the flower beds at the Diamond Gardens. Never, perhaps, did the beds present a prettier picture than at present, with the nicely-varied plants in full bloom. A fine display of bridalrobe and marigolds make an attractive centrepiece. The scheme affecting the corner plots is likewise of a most artistic nature, the centre in each case being filled with P. Crampel geraniums and calceolarias, and the border being composed of aleysium or artavara. Scotch visitors have been struck with the magnificence of the gardens, and some will even admit that they compare favourably with the well-known Glasgow beauty spot - St. George's Square. In these warm days, the Diamond certainly suggests an idea of freshness and repose, and the scene is one on which the eye loves to linger. In view of the coming Visitation of the Irish Society, at whose expense the Diamond Gardens are maintained, it is gratifying to have the garden plots attired in so rich a garb.



Before 1780. Calling Squares 'diamonds' is a feature of Ulster urban topography. 24No. premises. Nos.4-6 Austin's burnt in 1903, reopened 1907. First DA numbers in 1933. Oldest surviving part is 21-24, former McKinley's to M&M Scott, 7-12 gone in 1979 for Richmond Centre.

Before 1702. William III of England (1650-1702). 
